It is an established fact that the Indian tribes of this continent are steadily diminishing in numbers, and that, unless some means be discovered of checking the depletion, these aborigines will ultimately and entirely disappear. Recent investigations point to a somewhat similar declension in the colored race in the United States; that is to say, the death rate among them is far higher than among the whites. In Washington, for example, in the year 1875, while only 19.22 died out of every thousand white residents, there were 47.60 deaths out of every thousand coloured, about the same proportion being sustained in the succeeding years. In Richmond the per thousand death rate was 17.36 white to 28.13 coloured. In New Orleans 25.45 white to 39.69 coloured.
