IMPORTANT PROCLAMATION.

Washington, May 9. President Johnson has issued a proclamation declaring that, whereas armed resistance to the authority of the government, in certain States heretofore declared to be insurrection, may be regarded as virtually at an end, and the persons by whom that resistance as well as the operations of the insurgent cruisers were directed are fugitives of captives, and whereas it is under stood that some of those cruisers are still infesting the high seas, and others are preparing to capture, burn and destroy vessels of the United States, he enjoins all naval, military and civil officers of the United States diligently to endeavor by all lawful means to arrest the said cruisers, and to ! bring them into a port of the United States, in order that they may be prevented from committing further depredations on commerce, and that the persons on board of hem may no longer enjoy impunity for their crimes: and he further proclaims and declares that if after a reasonable time shall have elapsed for this proclamation to become known in the ports of nations claim. ing to have been neutral, the said insurgent ! cruisers and the persons on board of them, shall continue to receive hospitality in the I Ireland. said ports, this government will deem itself justified in refusing hospitality to the public vessels of such nations in ports of the United States, and in adopting such other measures | will take place from her late residence, as may be deemed advisable toward vindicating the national sovereignty. 
