THE LAW AS TO SPEARING FISH.

As the above appears just now to be of considerable interest, we will state briefly what the law is. The spearing of fish is by the recent statue prohibited entirely during the whole year, to all but Indians. This, if must be mentioned, is only to allow them to spear fish for their own use; if they spear and sell to white men, both parties are table to be punished.
