Canadian Firm Asked For the Ruling WASHINGTON, June 15,-A Canadian firm, dealing in sporting goods, has precipitated a controversy with the appraiser at Detroit over the value put by the appraiser upon a large invoice of goods imported from Montreal through the Detroit custom house and consigned to Chicago. The Dominion Cartridge Co. filed a protest in Open for sale the treasury department alleging that their goods were sold at duty paid prices, and entered at the Canadian market values; that the appraiser at Detroit raised Chicago, duty paid; that upon re-apprais-ment the advanced duty was sustained, but that the appraiser has declined to advise the company on what grounds the advance in value was made.
