McConnell accused of assaulting and dis iguring with tar and feathers' George Livingston, on June 9th, near Ellisville. The trial occurred, Saturday, before Justices Cawley and Moulton. George Livingston testified that about

thirty persons surrounded his house. A number entered it and carried him into the yard. It was a bright moonlight night, He proceeded : "They pulled the drawers off me and tried to take my shirt off, but did not succeed. They tore the buttons off my shirt and yanked it several times, but did not succeed in getting it off. When I got out into the yard I knew my assailants.
They had their faces blackened. There names are : Thomas McConnell, William McConnell, James Dillon Thomas McMillan and Michael Dillon. There was also a crowd standing around. Michael Dillon and our stock was never me. They daubed tar on me. I did not 80 complete. see any of the prisoners daub tar on me; neither of them put feathers on me. Thos, and Wm. McConnell went and got a rail. About a dozen took hold of me and tried to put me on the rail but did not succeed. The two men assisted to carry me to a creek, where they pitched me in. The water was about two and a half feet deep, them came back and pulled me, out. think if they had Not pulled me out would have drowned. I was tired and exhausted on account of the shaking up I; got in the house. It

was a cold night when they pulled me out of the water. They left me lying on the bank and then went away. When recovered I went to the house. I have known the prisoners ten or fifteen years and only live about a mile from them. could not be deceived in their identity. know their voices. Thomas McConnell spoke when he was getting the rail, but do not remember of William McConnell speaking. The party tried to blindfold me when they first took me down stairs and also tried to put on blindfold when in the yard, but they did not succeed in keeping it on more than an instant at a time George Bracken warned me there would

be a racket by the boys if I did not get rid of Mrs. Daley. William Livingston, father of the previous witness, related his experience, after he was carried outside, a quilt having been wrapped about his head. "After taking the quilt off my head I saw the two Me-Connell boys having hold of a rail, also Michael Dillon and Thos. McMillan and Wm. Jas. Dillon with the rest of the crowd in the yard. The first I saw of the five persons named they were within six feet of each other in the yard at the back of the house. They had a little black on their faces. I swear positively that the five persons named were the men I saw." He told of the men trying to mount his son on a rail, but failing, and then dragging him to. the creek and shoving him in. Thomas and William McConnell and W. J. Dillon did this. After George was pulled out the White Caps dispersed, but returned to George and snapped something like a revolver. George had tar on his head and part of his body ; the tar burned his face. He was positive in his identification of the
