THE SHOCKING MASSACRE OF MISSIONARIES IN CHINA f. Gregory Tells the Story of the Attack - How the Different Members of the Party Were Put to Death and

"I immediately went into the yamen where hundred of excited natives fixed at ready gathered and requested the district magistrate Wong to send some soldiers at once to Hwa-Sang to protect those still living. In half an hour the magistrate went to Hwa Sang under an escort of about sixty soldiers.

"At three p. m. f left Ku Cheng city under an e-cort of thirteen soldiers, arriv ing at Hwa-Sang at eight p. m., to find that nine adults, all British subjects, had been murdered, and all those still alive at Hwa-Sang eight only had been more or less severely injured excepting Mr. Phillips, arrived there only two or three days before and was lodging at a native house some distance from the English cottages.
