



The especial characteristics of the geyser are the short duration of its eruption and its regular periodicity. The most celebrated geyser of the Yellowstone park, the Old Faithful, hurls forth its columns of water and steam during five minues at regular intervals of 68 minutes.

These two characteristics have been faithfully reproduced with a simple table of metal, filled with water, opening at the top into a large basin and heated below, The lower layers of water come into abul-



lition at a temperature as much higher as the pressure that they undergo is stronger. Then all the mass of water in the tube begins to boll, the length of the column of water diminishing. Then comes a mo-ment when the steam springs above the basin, carrying a mass of water, more or less large, then falls back to mingle with the colder water, to begin again a few minutes later after the fashion of Old

A Colossal Bottle

At the Bordeaux exhibition will be seen the largest bottle ever made. It will be no less than 35 meters, or nearly 115 feet, high, and it will represent a bottle of tonic bitters. To the Bordeaux exhibition it will be what the Kiffel tower was to the Paris exhibition of 1889. The whole will be surmounted by a kiosk in the guise of a cork, which will afford a shelter from the sun or rain.
