

THE MOTHER DEAD AND CHIL DREN NEGLECTED.

The Eldest a Daughter Said to Have Beer Found in Bad Company, Rescued and Taken in Charge by the Children's Ald Society-A Sobbing Father.

A sad spectacle was presented in the lice court this morning, when a man named Brown walked into the court followed by his family of five children, the oldest a girl of fourteen, and the youngest a child of three or four, to answer to a charge of neglecting his children.
