

The Missoula was owned by Capt. Thomas
Wilson, of Cleveland, and was valued at \$80,000. Her cargo consisted of 70,000 bushels of wheat and valued at \$50,000. She had been in the wheat carrying trade between the head of the lakes and Buffalo for several seasons. Three of the crew live at Superior and the rest at points down the lakes, principally at Cleveland.


