cently brought out is a cane with a sliver dagger as a handle. In another a hunting scene is represented by a stag that has been brought to a kneeling posture by two dogs clinging to either side.

In the natural woods, such as the Weichsel and Pimento, the creamentation consists of knobs and snake-like coils of allver and gold ornaments. These applied pieces of metal are often engraved in fanciful designs, but the plain polished surfaces contrasf very well with the natural wood. A novelty for a Malacca has a snake coiled about the upper end, and his projecting head, as in the act of striking a foe, serves as a handle. Some who have their canes made to order have added to the realism of the snake by having it covered with leather tanned from the reel snake skin. there is an abundance of gold, stiver, platfrum, ivory, ebony and horns from the




