

When Requested. Lownor, Nov. 18 - The representative Constantinople of the United Press telegraphs under yesterdag's date that despatches from Sivas, Ated Nov. 15th, have been received there, dating that the mas-secres in the Marsovage and Amasia districts were renewed that day. The corespondent also states that a number of groups were killed at Sivas on the 16th. United States minister Tarrell received a despatch from Alepho on the 16th, saying that a massacre had occurred at Aintab, sixty miles north north-east of Alepho. The governor of Alepho was immediately instructed by wire to strenously enforce the measures taken for protecting American residents in his jurisdiction. Minister Terrell has obtained from the porte, an order for a guard of troops to protect the American missionaries who with their families, are about to proceed
