It is something in this world to know, as you wander among the equine wonders, that you are in good, strong, good company. The most tangible evidence of its success, found in the fact that the stock, which was bought at twenty-five dollars a pair ten years ago, is now worth, in the hands of the present owners, at least ten times that sum; and an old horseman said to me last week, "It is money that talks."

When the fair tale of the Marlborough-Vanderbilt wedding was told with all its pride, pomp and circumstance, it seemed as if nothing in the way of weddings could ever surpass it; but another wedding took place this week in the same church, St. Thomas, where everything seemed to challenge comparison, and which, if it did not entirely eclipse the Marlborough wedding, at least it lost nothing by the contrast.

The occasion was the marriage of Miss Pauline Payne Whitney, the daughter of the late Secretary of the Navy, William C. Whitney, to Almeric Hugh Paget, a son of Lord Alfred Paget, belonging to one of the most distinguished families in England. The floral decorations of the church, the thing was possible, the Marlborough wedding, and in the distinguished character of the bride, the wedding was not surpassed on any similar occasion. It was the most magnificent of the Italian company—Jean de Reszke, Mme. Norton, and several others, who the instrumental portion was superb. The wedding presents were rare and costly, and November will be long remembered as the red letter marrying month of the year.
