He Was Inaugurated at Washington To-day.

THOUSANDS WATCHED

AS THE GRAND PAGEANT SWEP ALONG THE ROUTE.

Only Two Ex-Presidents Alive-Imposing Spectacular Effects-Graceful Exchange of Courtesies-Administering the Oath of Office-It Jeremony Before the Capital.

WASHINGTON, March 4.-William Mc-Kinley, of Ohio, was to day installed as president of the United States for the term of four years, continuing until the 4th of March, 1901, and Grover Cleveland for the second time passed from the exercise of the high office of president and re-entered private life. In his capacity as expresident he has but one living contempor-\$1.05 ary, his immediate predecessor, Benjamin Harrison. All the others who within the last thirty years, by election or succession, have preside over the destinies of the great American republic-Lincoln, Johnson, Grant, Hayes, Garfield and Arthur,-
