Mr. Curzon read a telegram from the British consul at Canea, Sir A. Bilotti, an nouncing the fact of the relief from a position of great peril of 523 men, 1,047 women and children, 340 soldiers and 1,000 Mussuleman refugees, who had been besieged at Kandama by christian insurgents.

The despatch added that the rescued Cretans were embarking on board warships at Selino, at which place the consulate was danger of being attacked by christians after the departure of the warships for the purpose of landing the refugees and others on board at places of safety.


