M. C. D. BORDEN RULES THE PRINT CLOTH MARKET.


Bold Operations That Startled the Dry Goods World-How He Cornered Cot. ton Goods, Buoyed Up the Market and Started Many Mills Eunning.

"What price can you give me on 1,000 pieces of prints?" asked a New York buy. er of a Fall River cloth manufacturer. "Can't do better than 3 cents."

"What, 3 cents! Why, I got quotations at 2 % only yesterday. What's up today?"

"Well, Matt Borden's in town." It is an actual fact that whenever Mr. Borden goes to Fall River the price of print cloths goes up a point or two. There is a good, sound reason for this too. The price of prints is not a feather to be lift. ed by the breath of any chance rumor: not when the warehouses are piled full of bolts and bales and millions of spindles are idle because the mill owners do not ()

visits to Fall River which will long be remembered. The first was in 1893, when he was known merely as a large mill own. er with a New York commission house—a



man who had been active and successful. but who had not as yet gained the title of king of the print trade. Fall River hac not begun to pay attention to Mr. Borden's movements. So when he dropped in one day in December no one looked for any thing unusual. It was the winter after the panie, and everything was flat. Mr. Bor den went quietly to work and bought ev ery piece of print in sight. Then he slip ped over to Providence and bought all b could get there. He was back in New York before the rest of the print men realized that he had purchased 700,000 pieces of cloth, and when he opened his commissior store the next morning he found that he had put a prop under the falling market and boosted prices to a full time schedule. Then it was realized that Mr. M. C. D. Borden of Fall River and New York was a factor in the cloth trade who was worthy of serious attention.

His latest important visit to Fall River was not long ago, and the people in the dry goods trade all over the country are still talking about it. This time he went in secret. All winter long the market has been in the slough of despond into which it fell during the presidential campaign of last fall. The Fall River looms had beer running in a hesitating manner for months and any of the 70 mill owners would have been glad of an excuse to shut down.

Ever since last November the market had been going from bad to worse. Ever a purchase of 300,000 pieces at 2% cents by Mr. Borden did not stop the decline and finally prints reached 212, the lowest price in the history of the trade. There was a surplus stock of 1,500,000 pieces still on hand, and it was being added to every day. Then Mr. Borden proposed a scheme for clearing the market. The Fall River mill men signed an agreement to stor 3,500,000 spindles for 13 weeks, which would curtail the production by 60,000 pieces a week. This braced the market up some, but no one was prepared for what followed. Mr. Borden quietly met the treasurers of three big mills and told them he would buy for spot cash, at 2 9-16, al. the prints they could find. They turned over to him 37,500,000 yards, and, as he was still unsatisfied, made contracts to de liver to him 250,000 more pieces, making 1,000,000 pieces in all at the same price. This bold stroke sent the market up one eighth of a cent a yard, and this advance

Mr. Borden's competitors will have to meet if they buy prints while the market is in its present condition. If, as this dar ing speculator believes, there will be a still further advance, instead of a slump, they will have to pay much more, and he will clear somewhere in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000.

The deal caused the greatest sensation which has been known in the trade for years. It also cleaned out the Fall River warehouses, put the market on its feet and set millions of spindles to whirling once more. It took a great investment of capi tal and an unlimited confidence in the pre diction that good times are surely coming again.
