

It is intended to raise from \$50,000,000 to \$60,000,000 more revenue under the bill than is provided by existing law under similar business condi-Duties have been advanced for the double purpose of protection and revenue. Another important rule which has

governed the committee is the substitution of specific duties wherever possible instead of those based upon values. Such duties have been restored upon nearly of the chemical schedules, many articles of iron and steel, upon sugar, upon agricul tural products and upon many sundries. It is in textiles, however, that the greatest care has been taken in transforming ad valorem into specific duties.

The common schedule was made specific in form, with the exception of some general provisions, when the present law was framed. The duty per yard was based upon the number of threads to a yard, thereby permitting an increase of rates up. Total, \$16. on the finer goods. A similar system of classification is applied in the new tariff to manufactures of flax and silk. WON'T REVERT TO HIS RULE And The Cretaus Will Fully Understand

What This Means. LONDON, March 15.-In the house o commons to-day the announcement was made by Right Hon. G. N. Curson, under foreign secretary, that no reply had as yet ultimatum. The foreign admirals in Cretan bute the Cretans throughout the island and proclaim to the inhabitants of Crete the fact that the powers would be responsible for the future of the island. In the meantime, he said, preparations were being made for the establishment of an autonomous administration in the island.

Hon. T. W. Legh, conservative member for the Newton division of Lancashire, asked if the Cretans would understand what autonomy meant.

Mr. Curzon: "Considering the fact that New carpets, curtains, etc., arriving the Cretans have been agitating for autonomy for a hundred years (cries of *'So have the Irishmen," and cheers from the home rule benches), it may be presumed that they know the meaning of autonomy Anyhow it may be clearly understood that the island will not revert to the rule of the sultan." (Cheers.)
