

PREACHER

PRISONER BUT AS A VISITOR.

He Called at the Kingston Penitentiary and Realized All the Horrors That Surrounded a Life In the Penal Institution Ready for Sunday.

At London, Ont., recently, Rev.

homas Wilson, in the King street 'resbyterian church, delivered an address on the subject, "An hour in the Kingston penitentiary." The speaker stated that while a delegate to the presbytery at Kingston he had visited the "Pen." "I will never forget," he said, "the click of that lock as the gate shut behind us. To me it meant little; but to some it meant years of confinement and disgrace." In the warden's office I asked, "What effect does this life have upon you? Does it make you harder?" "No," was the reply. "The longer I am here the more I am convinced of this, that the grace of God has kept me while it has allowed others to fall. There are many people in here who should be out, and many outside who should be locked up. Men laid devilish plans and then hired people who were possibly starving for bread to carry them out. The latter were the men who went to jail, and while the plotter was the leader in society. The man who places a boy in jail for stealing a paper from his door, was no doubt the man who at that instant was watering his goods, damping his sugar and stretching his yard stick to defraud people by the thousand."

Mr. Wilson graphically described the workhouse and the asylum. Speaking of the kitchen, he said: "I saw an immense pile of potatoes. 




