A scheme that meets with one that is likely to be adopted by the council, is to have the sum charged against the city by the water works department for water supplied hydrants, for street watering, etc., representing \$2,400, be cut off, and that the service be supplied the city free of cost. It is argued that citizens should receive some benefit for the risk of backing up the bonds issued for the purchase of the plant. Of course benefits have been derived through the reduction of rates, etc., but it is felt that something beyond this should be given the people, and to satisfy this feeling it is suggested that the annual charge of \$2,400 against the city be done away with.

An argument against this suggestion, is pointed out, is the fact that by the adoption of this scheme citizens not using the service, as well as those who contribute to the funds of the water works department, would be benefited alike, which would scarcely be fair.
