The law of Oklahoma is very severe on polygamy, and Indians on reservations are not exempt from its operations. The Kickapoos have an average of five squaws each. The Cheyennes and Arapahoes are nearly all polygamists, as are the Kiowas and Apaches, Comanches and Wichitas. OTTAWA, April 8. - The estimates for the coming year were brought down by Mr. Fielding to-day. It is difficult to put finance into English, and tedious to read columns of figures, but a somewhat extended reference to the cost of operating the government of Canada will probably be received in good part by the people who pay the bills. Last year, it will remembered, the newly organized liberal government accepted the estimates prepared by the outgoing government, because there was no time to investigate and review them. Mr. Laurier announced that the money voted would not be spent if it were not required. As a matter of fact very considerable sums have been left over in the form of unexpended balances.
