Sir Charles Tupper could not resist the opportunity to ask if there was no chance of having the tariff changes before the 20th, the date of the Nova Scotia elections. To this Mr. Fielding made answer that this was not the intention, but he could assure his honorable friend that the tariff would be one that would largely assist the liberal party in the Nova Scotia elections were it necessary to do so. An immediate result of the announcement as to when the tarit would come down was a distinct change of opposition tactics. Mr. Foster asked what business the government proposed to take up till the time for bringing in the budget.
