cotton duties from twenty-two-and-a-half to twenty-five per cent. in cotton fabrics printed, dyed or colored from thirty to 100 pairs of Crompton's corsets, 50c.; thirty-five per cent. All cotton or linen goods made by seamstresses are taxable at thirty-five per cent., as are collars, cuffs, etc., of cotton formerly running up as high Miss Winter, visiting her sister, Mrs. J. as sixty per cent. in some cases. duties will be levied under the maximur tariff and greatly lessen importation from the United States. On the other hand, the fabrics and manufactures of wool clothes, blankets, flannels, tweeds, overcoatings, ready-made clothing of wool, in whole or in part, which come mainly from Great Britain, are all grouped together at a rate of thirty-five per cent. Formerly woollen cents per pound and twenty-five per cent., and other clothing five cents per pound great in the coarser sorts of woollens, as Mr. Paterson pointed ont. Even were British woollens admitted only on the tariff the result would be five per cent. lower than the general one, the advantage will be even greater. Not only so, but the duty on woollen yarns is reduced from five cents per pound and twenty per cent. ad valorem to fifteen per cent. ad valorem, so that the manufacturers of woollens in Canada may be able to face the reductions in the duties on their finished products.
