NOW THE VOTERS WILL ACT.

ELEVATOR REPORT ACCEPTED AND APPROVED BY COUNCIL. Met with Not Weak Opposition Last Night. Agreement Signed and Sealed—Means By-Law Will Be Voted on Next Month.

The city council held a special meeting last evening to receive and act upon the report of the grain elevator committee. Mayor Skinner presided and there were in attendance Alds. Allen, Bell, Elliott, Carson, Donnelly, Kent, Johns, Livingston, Minner, Mooers, McKelvey, Richardson, C. Robinson, W. Robinson, Ryan, Stewart, Tait, Taylor, Toys, Walkem, Wright—22.

Ald. Carson introduced a by-law to amend by-law No. 402, respecting wooden buildings, to give the city commissioner authority to take steps to secure safety of citizens in connection with scaffolding at buildings in course of erection, and in case of buildings that are in danger of falling.

Chairman Donnelly of the special grain elevator committee presented his committee's report, as published in another column to-day, recommending that said report be adopted and that a by-law be prepared for submission to the people in accordance with the city's offer to bonus for building an elevator here.

Chairman Donnelly moved Mr. Mooers and the committee also were prepared to change clause two of the agreement so as to give to the city engineer, the chairman of the elevator committee and two other aldermen, to pass upon the elevator plans and specifications and to say whether or not they shall be accepted by the city.

The agreement was taken up and discussed clause by clause. Clause one was passed with the amendment that the cost of the elevator, including the site, be \$100,000 instead of \$90,000.

On motion of Ald. Donnelly clause two was amended so as to have the plans and specifications referred to the city engineer, the chairman of the elevator committee, two other aldermen and a fifth person to be named by the committee. This amendment was accepted, and the clause as thus changed was passed.

Clause three was passed unchanged. Ald. McKelvey moved to amend clause four to read "the elevator shall be built within an area between West street and Cataragui bridge." Both he and Ald. Richardson and Wright held that any site west of West street would be too exposed.

Clause five, six, seven, eight and nine were adopted without amendment, and clause ten was amended to read that the committee in which the elevator is insured shall be satisfactory to the city.

THE JUBILEE BATTALION.

A Portrait and Sketch of a 14th P. W. O. Rifle Representative. PARAGRAPHS PICKED UP BY OUR BUSY REPORTERS.

SEKRGT-MAJOR J. D. CANNON. The original of the cut which bests this sketch represents a third generation of soldiers. His grandfather, William Cannon, tailor, served his queen and country in the imperial service. His father was connected with the Governor-General's Foot Guards for some years, and as soon as he was able to shoulder a rifle, the subject of this sketch joined the 14th P.W.O.R.

Born near the village of Wilton in 1872, he took up his residence in this city when a mere lad. The spirit of a soldier was strong within him, and in 1890, when only seventeen years of age, he enlisted in "C" company as a private. He made rapid progress in the matter of drill and discipline, and it was not long before he stood at the head of the company's list as the smartest man in the rank and file.

As soon as a supernumerary rank became vacant he was promoted, attaining the post of full corporal. This was in 1892, and the following season he was advanced again to sergeant's stripes. His soldierly qualities marked him for further promotion, and in 1894 his name was read out in orders as having been advanced to the rank of company color-sergeant. He filled the duties of this post for two seasons, and in 1896 he was selected by the officers for the most important rank that can be held by a non-commissioned officer, that of sergeant-major.

The duties of which post he at present fills to the satisfaction of the officers and to the credit of the corps. Last year he took a month's course at No. 2 depot, R. R. C. I., passing creditably in all examinations tried. Officers connected with the school complimented him upon his wide range of knowledge covering military matters. While color-sergeant of "C" company it stood highest in point of efficiency at the regimental inspection.

Lieut.-Col. Cotton, D.O.C., paid a high tribute to the company last season, saying it reminded him of a company of a regiment in the imperial service, the men drilled like veterans. To this condition of efficiency much was due to the efforts of its then color-sergeant. Sergt.-Major Cannon is something of an athlete, showing a decided partiality for canoeing, at which sport he is an adept. He stands six feet two inches in height and weighs 175 pounds.

The steamer Saturn and consort, Serpentine River, timber, passed through the Welland canal bound for Collins Bay. The steamer Outhwaite was discharged last evening and expected to get away to-day with her consort, the schooner Barr.

The tug Jessie Hall arrived from Montreal last evening with four light barges and cleared again this morning with six grain laden.
