TO GIVE A MONEY BONUS.

For all the Beet Sugar Raised in the State of tev York.

ALBANY, N.Y., May 19. - After five years of vigorous fighting by the beet sugar manufacturers of the state the government has consented to give a money bonus for all beet sugar raised in any considerable quantity in this state. Governor Black today signed the bill that provides for a yearly bonus of \$25,000 to be paid out to beet sugar manufacturers at a rate not exceeding one cent a pound for every pound of ninety per cent. crystalized sugar prepared from beets grown within New York state, and for which the grocer receives not less than \$5 per tor, provided the sugar manufacturer is not the grower. The matter of examination and determination is placed in the hands of the state superintendent of agriculture.


