The president then pronounced an eulogy of Signor Fratti, during which he eaid that the late deputy died for the great cause of the independence of a nation. His remarks were greeted with cheers. Many of the deputies and the minister of public works, Signor Prinetti, in the name of the government, pronounced similar eulogies of the Italian,
