THE TEACHERS' CONVENTION Prof. Cappon Speaks On Principles Of

Teaching Literature. A joint session of the city and county teachers' associations was held in the Y.M.C.A. hall this morning at nine o'clock,

both being well represented. Prof. Cappon was the first speaker, and in a lengthy address outlined the principles of teaching literature. He expressed his thanks for the invitation to address the convention on this occasion. The teacher always had his sincere sympathy. He said that the teacher who does his work honestly and industriously is constantly educating himself. He referred to the help that associations are to the teacher in preparing him to intelligently criticise the methods and principlesof edu-

cation and establish in him a spirit of selfconfidence. He then referred to the study of literature as the most beneficial subject upon the school curriculum, whether we regard it as a means of mental training or as a source of useful knowledge, and the speaker showed how it can be made interesting in the public schools by teaching it purely as a literary subject, and with as little reference as possible to the grammatical or the logical analysis of the selection under consideration. principle by refer-

ence to Coleridge's "Ancient Mariner." In this selection the professor showed the three great steps necessary for its thorough mastery. First, the preliminary reading for the purpose of getting the drift of the author's ideas and the realization of the meaning. Second, its elecution, for the purpose of becoming familiar with any peculiarities in pronunciation. And third, the symmatic analysis of the style; first as to matter and second as to form. At the conclusion of the paper, some

juestions were asked him by R. K. Row, as to whether he considered it advisable to confine the teaching of literature in junior classes to the thorough mastery of particular selections, or whether it should consist of a hurried review of pieces in general, and also why the elocutional part should precede the analytical. In answer to this Prof. Cappon said that with primary pupils he thought the reference should be general, and that he would teach the elocution first in order to familiarize the pupil with the word forms and their force.

G. E. Bullis, superintendent of schools, Oswego, N.Y., gave a lengthy talk on general methods of teaching and management. The teacher and pupils must work on general principles and consistently, for "con sistency is a jewel." He gave several illustrations, each one clearly bringing out a point that is necessary to secure a perfection in teaching. Lastly, he sided with and dwelt on the meetings of teachers in these associations. At these conventions ideas of teaching are exchanged mutually, and one experienced teacher drops thou sands of points to the inexperienced who is aiming at becoming an efficient teacher.

FLOODED THE COUNTRY.

A Disastrous Accident by the Smashing of Canal Gates.

St. CATHARINES, Ont., May 21.-The first serious accident of this season on the Welland canal occurred this morning about 6:30 o'clock, when the American steambarge J. H. Outhwaite, commanded by Capt. J. E. Burke, crashed into the two head gates of lock 7. As the boat struck the gates they opened and allowed a small amount of water to enter.

When the impetus given the gates by the steamer was spent the force of the water in the one and a half mile level above caused the gates to rebound. Those who witnessed the accident hoped that when the rebound came the gates would fall into their places simultaneously and cause them to metre, but instead the right gate was forced back before the left. The water rushed through the opening between the two gates and in a twinkling the immense gates were torn from their iron fastenings as though they were ribbons, and carried away.

The water broke over both banks, tearing out almost the entire clay banks on the outside of the stone walls on the southwest side, rushing over farms and property and backed up as far as the city limits. The banks and adjacent property now present a delapidated appearance. Trees lay torn out by roots and gas mains are disconnected and washed out; fences carried

A Mr. Draper, of this city, was sitting on a fence near by when the accident happened and was washed seventy-five yards away. Although bruised, he managed to scramble out. It is expected navigation will be resumed in two or three days.


