





How Indian Names Might be Made. In the early English and contributing tongues all names were phrases, expressing some peculiarity of the person or giving his location, but the ideal English surname of to-day is a meaningless word of from one to three syllables. It would be an easy matter in constructing names for Indians to make them conform to working over of the Indian name, for fixed early in the history of the Indian service, if the men in charge at that time had taken the pains to do it. And, while I do not wish to censure the men now in charge at the various schools and agencies, all of whom have come in since the above mistaken schemes of Indian naming were set on foot, I may say that in some places it is not too late even now to make changes either forward or backward to the method indicated by the Department. Wherever change can be made it should in the intere of decency and humanity be done.
