KINGSTON WILL CELEBRATE THE QUEEN'S DIAMOND JUBILEE. Large and Enthusiastic Meeting Last Even

ing-Initial Steps Taken Towards Carrying Out the Celebration-'Twill be an Unusually Grand Affair. A large and enthusiastic meeting was held in the city council chamber last even-

ing, in response to the call of the mayor, to consider the advisability of celebrating her majesty's diamond jubilee, mayor Skinner presiding. Lieut. Col. Drennan was unanimously

chosen secretary. Among those present were clergymen of different denominations, military men, business men and professional men. On motion of alderman Walkem, second

ed by alderman Wright, it was decided to hold a celebration of her majesty's M. Campbell was the only one who voted

against the motion. He said he felt proud to be one who would vote against holding another day of debauchery, such as was held on May 24th It was enough to bring the blush of shame to the face of any honest man to see boys of no more than fourteen years of age staggering along the streets, drunk And such a sight was to be seen many times on May 24th. He did not wish to see such another debauch carried on, un der the name of a celebration of the birthday of our gracious queen, God bless her Every father who has sons and daughters must oppose the repetition of such a drunk

Mr. Campbell's utterances were received with a storm of mingled expressions of de precation and denial, and of applause. The majority of those present were not in accord with the views he had expressed, and for a few minutes a lively time was indulg

An alderman said it was well such an event occurred only once in sixty years "Yes," said Mr. Campbell, "you may ridicule it. You may laugh, but it is no laughing matter. The 'upper ten' may look down and laugh at us, who strive to prevent such debauches. I have children, and I do not want them to grow up in the midst of drunkenness and debauchery. You people of the 'upper ten' did not al go home sober on that day."

Secretary Drennan thought that dominion day would be the best day on which to hold the celebration. There will be four battalions of infantry in camp on Barriefield common then, and they will help to make the celebration a success. He moved that the celebration be held on July 1st. Other towns, Napanee, Brock ville, etc., will hold celebrations on June 22nd, and these will all detract from the success of our demonstration.

B. W. Folger, sr., favored June 22nd. Alderman Walkem also thought June 22nd the most suitable day. This date has been set apart throughout the empire as the day on which the subjects of the empire shall celebrate the diamond jubilee, and Kingston should make no departure

G. M. Macdonnell also took this view. and spoke strongly in favor of it. Outside of the dominion, dominion day is not public holiday, and it would be well to hold the celebration on the day that is common to the celebration throughout the

M. Campbell thought that if another debauch is to be held, the best day to hold it on would be the 22nd of June. Thrice was this repeated, and twice he paid back the money, but the third time he lost he decided not to again borrow. Thus the clerk won twenty four cents, but came out with only the original amount involved, thirteen cents. and an "I.O.U." for four cents, while the customer lost twenty-four cents but is out only four cents in addition to the original twelve cents lost. See?

The Street Car Company's Rights. The manager of the street car company was asked to-day if he had read Mr. Starr's statement about the company defying the law passed at the last session of the Ontario legislature.

"Yes," said B. W. Folger, "I heard the sermon and I give you the clause which I think speaks for itself. Any rights we re ceived by agreement with the city in 1893 and special act are not curtailed in any way by the late legislation." The clause in the last act reads :

Conference With the Mayor and City Solicitor - The Liability or the Manager of the Opera House Counted Out-The Mayor is Written to.

Representatives of the city clergy, ma," Skinner and city solicitor McIntyre held a conference last evening in the city council | FINE chamber to discuss the question of whether or not the proposed exhibition of the kinetoscope views of the Corbett-Fitzsimmons prize fight could be prevented. There were present, besides the mayor and the city solicitor. John McIntyre, Q.C., Rev. Dean Smith, Rev. Dean Carey, members attending the conference, the Rev. R. W. Rayson, Rev. J. E. Starr, Rev. D. Laing, Rev. C. W. King, G. M. Macdonnell, B. W. Robertson and others. Mayor Skinner presided. Addressing the mayor said he was as sternly opposed to exhibitions of this kind as it is possible to be, but the city solicitor advised him that no authority is vested in him to prevent the show.

Rev. R. W. Rayson thought the city by laws give authority to prevent the exbibition.

City solicitor McIntyre said the city bylaws give no such power. The county crown attorney is the official who should be appealed to in such a matter. Rev. J. E. Starr contended that the

mayor is the representative of supreme authority in the city and that he and city solicitor could "take the bull by the horns" and prohibit the show. The criminal code of Canada, 1892, was referred to, and it was finally agreed that

section 179, sub-section A, confers authority to prohibit the exhibition, although the city by laws do not. It was decided that mayor Skinner should write to the manager of the opera house, warning him of his liability in the case. Section 179, criminal code of Canada, sub-section A, reads thus:

"Every one is guilty of an indictable offence, and liable to two years' imprisonment, who, knowingly, without lawful justification or excuse, publicly sells or exposes for public sale or to public view, any obscene book or other printed or written matter, or any picture, photograph, model or other object tending to corrupt public

The mayor's letter to the manager of the opera house reads as follows: "Sir-I beg to call your attention to section 179 of the criminal code of Canada, 1892), which, in my opinion strictly forbids such a performance as I believe you propose giving in the opera house on Tuesday evening. In case, therefore, of such a performance taking place all persons responsible for it or connected with it including yourself, will be proceeded against. I trust, therefore, that no further steps will be taken towards carrying on the performance, and that it will be dropped forthwith. - J. S. SKINNER, mayor."
