THE VICTORIAN ORDER. The one great point made against the Victorian Order of Nurses, without at all affecting its popularity, is that the Canadian hospitals have graduated nurses who are available for service, and that these nurses graduate their fees as do the doctors as occasion requires. The answer to that is that these nurses have a tariff of fees made for them by the hospitals or doctors, and that not five per cent. of the sick can sfford to pay them, and certainly those away from the centres of population have no hope of appealing to them for assistance under the circumstances. The Victorian Order is calculated to give professional nurses to a class of people who have not hitherto known what professional and expert nursing is, and if a plebiscite could be taken it would be very heartily endorsed.

THE RECENT EXPLOSION. The commissioners of Ottawa synod, Church of England, appointed to settle accounts with the parent diocese of Ontario, in their report of results make this refer-

The injustice done is sincerely regretted now, but it should have been remedied immediately on the floor of the house, or in the press, since only a comparatively few know anything of those characteristics of the assailant, which have been relied upon to excuse the eruption.

SENATORIAL ACTION. While the debate was taking place in the senate upon the act to prevent exhibition of prize fighting scenes and publication of details of fights in newspapers, Sir Oliver Mowat remarked that he had received letters from Anglican clergymen and several benevolent and religious societies in Kingston and other parts of the country, as also appeals from mothers. The Hon. Mr. Adams, referring to these appeals, asked whether the criminal code was to be changed in response to such letters or on the judgment of the members of that chamber? Were men of great experience in life, of superior intellect, to give way because the minister of justice had been asked by some old women to make changes? What right had senators to issue a bulletin proclaiming that men or women are immoral when they have no proof to warrant them? A lady wrote him a letter appealing to him to prohibit certain classes of literature. He wrote back ask ing for the names of the books and has not heard from her. But the senator's argument was immediately followed by the passage of the prohibitory legislation, and the victory very properly belongs in part to Kingston's "old women."

POST OFFICE FINANCING. When demand were formerly made that the rate of postage should be reduced they were met with the contention that the public finances would not permit of it. The post office department was very ex pensive, and always run at a loss, and Sir Adolph Caron and John Haggart, the representative men in the conservative government who brought their massive minds to bear upon the subject, simply could not think of adding in any way to its annual deficits. Mr. Haggart, indeed imbibed the remarkable philosophy that the dearer an article the more eager the people will be to invest in it, and so he


