Trial at Belleville, BELLEVILLE, April 14.- The trial of Peter Davis for the murder of William Emory in the Township of Marmora on Sept. 19 last. and of Mary Emory, wife of the murdered man, as an accessory, was begun at the Assizes before Chief Justice Armour this

who was a farmer and lived i Marmora township, left his home on Thurs day, Sept. 19, and went to a marsh about three miles distant to cut hay, taking with him a rifle and a scythe. He did not return that night and on the following day he was found dead where he had been workingshot through the heart. His rifle was standing upright about six feet from his body, the muzzle having been forced into the soil to depth of five or six inches.

An inquest was held when the med testimony showed that it could not have been a case of suicide. The evidence developing the fact that an improper intimacy had existed between the murdered man wife and Davis and that there had been bad blood between the men and an exchange of threats of violence, the coroner's jury re turned a verdict of wilful murder against Davis, who was committed to jail here. The woman, who afterwards came to town with the object of being near her paramour, went to her father's house in Marmora a few days ago and was there arrested as an access sory last week.
