> A Poor House Burnt. UTICA, N.Y., May 8.—The Chenango county poor house and insane asylum, located at Preston, six miles west of Norwich, were entirely consumed last night. The fire was discovered about eleven o'clock in the north wing of the poor house building, where the idiots were kept. There were no provisions for extinguishing the flames. The keepers and neighbors gave their attention to getting out the 125 paupers and insane. These were all rescued, but eleven idiots are missing in the ruins Six bodies can be seen slowly burning ; the other five are sup posed to be covered up. The origin of the fire is unknown. Yesterday afternoon a woman was in the idiot department smoking. She put her pipe in her pocket and was soon enveloped in flames. She ran out into the yard and was secured.
