People will congregate together in communities, and they expect o have the refuse of their households safely disposed of after it has been collected by a water carriage, or otherwise, so that it shall not be in any way or degree a nuisance to others. Refuse is not disposed of when it has been deposited in the back yard, in a esspool, in a stream of water, or in a lake.




