Volcanie Silver. The existence of silver in volcanic ashes i of rare occurrence. Only in two cases have argentiferous ashes been met with. The Was an eruption of Cotopaxi, in July, 1885, in the ashes of which Mr. J. W. Malet proved the existence of one part of silver in 83,-000 parts of ashes. In the following year the same investigator was able to add a second iustance. In January, 1886, a violent eruption of Tunguragu, in the Andes of Ecuador, between 50 and 55 miles from Cotopaxi, took place, the eruption continuing at longer or shorter intervals up to

November of the same year. The ashes thrown up by this volcano, which has been at rest for over a century, contained silver to the extent of one part n 107,200 parts of ashes. This appears, at first sight, to be only a very small percentage of the metal. But when it is considered what enormous quantities of ashes are erupted and what a vast extent of area they cover after an eruption, the quantity of the silver thrown up with them must be.

To Remove Superfluous Hair. Depilatories are very dangerous remedies unless kept in the hands of very careful persons. They are liable to not only take off the offending hair, but also the skin as well and leave ugly sores to heal and form scars. The Turkish women are said to be very proficient in the use of depilatories, as they have no hair on their bodies, with the exception of the head. Nearly all forms depilatories depend upon some form of sulphides of the alkaline earths. Probably the safest among the effective

ones is made from the ordinary quick lime. It should be slacked with two parts of water and then saturated with freshly made sulphureted hydrogen. This mixture must be used a few days after it is made. Care must always be taken to see that the paste does not cover more surface than it is necessary to free from hair. It is also a wise precaution to spread but a small space at a time and when this is deprived of hair treat a fresh portion of the surface Phar-




