

"They received me with the utmost politeness and good breeding, and in all my intercourse with the farmers found the simple and dignified courtesy of a s li-respecting people.

She conversed with Boers, old and Papiop young, rich and poor; and also with the foreigners, of whom there were many.

"If we may judge of the sincerity by the sacrifices men will make, they have given proof enough. All had risked in the cause of the Boers their whole posressions and their lives. The foreigners were men whose words deserve attention. Not one of them, it must be remembered, was a mercenary. Not one had been a paid soldier."

She found these foreigners full of the praises of the Boers.
