I value no part of my own education more than what I learned on a farm. Not that I want to do any of those things now, but that the habit meeting things squarely and doing them was a vital part of my education. The Forizon of the farm is narrow, but good for a boy. It leads him to see churly. To get face to face with nature and action, is the purpose of "nature study" and "manual training which in the city schools imperfectly take the place of farm life and work. Minor advantages of the farm are its health and freedom, the absence wasteful leisure, and the certainty mastery over the horse, a thing without which no man should be turned loose in the world as educated.
