TROOPER HAWLEY WRITES.

Now With the Light Horse at

Kronstadt-In Many Fights. H. M. Hawley, manager of Stroud's tea story, Princess street, yesterday received a letter from his brother, trooper W. H. Hawley, of "E" squadron, Prince of Wales light horse, on active service in South Africa. The letter was written from Kroenstadt on April 4th, and contains some interesting information. The light horse reached that place on the 3rd, after ten weeks long marching.

"We have had hard knocks," the writer continues. 'We had several engagements in five days, driving the Boers from kopje to kopje. days ago one of our sergeant-majors was killed, and one sergeant and four troopers drowned. We killed eighteen Boers and took eleven prisoners. My Dr. Duff, \$5; H. Henderson, \$1.30; Ca. mate, who worked on the Natal government railway (where Mr. Hawley was employed before enlisting), and six others were captured or shot three weeks ago. It was a very dark night, and when morning came we could not find them. Lots of men are missing. Out of our troop of twentynine, we had only fourteen at the last


