WILFRID ATTENDED LAURIER'S SUGGESTION.

The Movement Towards Believed the Colonies Being Called Into the Motherland's Councils is Progressing-Depends on Posterity. London, July 2.-Colonial secretary

Chamboerlain was one of the speakers at the dominion day banquet last evening. He made the friendliest and most appreciative references to Canada. In the course of his remarks, on the dominion's advance since tederation, he incidentally said that the advantages derived from federation furnished a suggestion of the possibility and advantages of a still greates union in which sister nations should be held together by common interest and common aspirations. Alluding to Sir Wilfrid Laurier's suggestion, that the colonies be called into the motherland's councils, Mr. Chamberlain said he believed the movement in that direction was progressing. The movement must emanate from the colonies, but if they showed a desire for a closer connection and were willing to assist, not only with arms, but in councils, he believed there was nothing in this country that would be more reachly welcome. Much of the speech was taken up

by an expression of appreciation of colonial help in the war and in connection with this subject Mr. Chamberlain declared that a political opponent lately said that they must look to the opinion of civilized Europe for a verdict on their policy. He said he had great respect for civilized Europe, but he looked with greater confidence to the verdict of posterity from the unbiased opinion of the colonies than to the uninstructed prejudice and envy of foreign nations who greedily swallowed every lie festened upon them by enemies abroad and traitors at home. In the house of commons yesterday

Joseph Chamberlain, the colonial secretary, in reply to a question from the Right Hon. John Morley, justi fied the expenditure of money for the public service in Cape Colony by warrants signed by the governor without legislative authority. Mr. Chamberlain maintained that such action was warranted by the invasion of the Colony by the Boers and the fact that it was impossible to fix a time for the meeting of the Cape parliament. He hoped that the parliament might meet early in October.

CARNEGIE'S WISH.

But All His Wealth Could Not Secure it.

July 2 .- T. P. O'Connor London, published a remarkable conversation which he had with Andrew Carnegie at Skibo. He says: "As we drove down to the station, I was saving how I envied him his wealth. He said. 'I am not really to be envied. How can my wealth help me? I am sixty vears of age, and I cannot digest my food. I would give you all my mil lions if you would give me youth and health.' Then I shall never forget his next remark. We had driven some yards in silence, when Mr. Carnegie suddenly turned and in hushed voice. and with bitterness and depth of 'eeling quite indescribable said: 'If I could make Faust's bargain I would. would gladly sell anything to have half my life over again.' And i raw his hands clench as he spoke."

ANOTHER BANK CLOSED.

The Niagara Bank In Buffalo Shuts Its Doors.

Buffalo, N.Y., July 2.-At 10.30 o'clock this morning, the Niagara bank, on Ellicott square, closed its doors, and state superintendent of Frank D. Kilborn, took charge. The capital stock of the Niagara bank is \$100,000 and at the time of its last report there was a surplus of \$10,500. No other bank here is affected. This morning the board of directors

of the suspended City National bank went into session with the hope that before they adjourned a tangible plan of reorganization and resumption would be agreed upon.
