

VACCINATION STOPPED.

Four Fatal Cases of Lockjaw Cleveland.

Cleveland, O., July 31.-Vaccination for the prevention of smallpox has been stopped in Cleveland by order of health officer Friedrich, because four fatal cases of lockjaw have occurred within a few weeks and these fatalities together with the fact that many people who were vaccinated suffered with very sore arms, led Dr. Friedrich to believe that the vaccine lymph used is impure and contaminated. An investigation will at once be made to locate the source of the trouble.
