A New York man named Robert letters and cheques which were not intended for him. After taking con bert Treat Paine lived in Boston, who was evidently entitled to the misplaced correspondence. So Paine of New York wrote a polite letter to Paine of Boston forwarding the mail matter with valuable enclosures which belonged to the latter; at the same time courteously requesting the Boston Robert Treat Paine to notify his correspondents of the mistake they had been making in addressing their remittances, whereupon Paine of New York received the following reply:

"Your letter, with its enclosure, has been received by me. I hope you will allow me to express my sincere regret that you should bear the name that by right of lineal descent belongs to me and my family here in Boston. There is no other direct male decendant of Robert Treat Paine, signer of the declaration of independence, who was the first to bear that name. the name was given to you out of honor to the signer, I think such practice should not receive the sanction of thoughtful persons."
