BEEN STRUCK

AND MURDER IS NOW LIKELY THE CHARGE.

Inquest Will Be Held-What the Doctors Have to Say-The Dead Man May Have Fallen From a Loft.

Toronto, Aug. 24.-There are circumstances in the case of James Walker, found dead in the stables of the Commercial hotel, on Jarvis street, yesterday, which point to murder. Walker was found lying on his back and apparently had fallen from the loft of the stable. The doctor who performed an autopsy found, however, that the only mark of violence on Walker was a flesh wound well back on the middle of the forehead, and about the size of a fifty cent piece. The wound was in the scalp only, the skull not being fractured; but the doctor discovered that, directly below wound, a clot of blood had formed on the Brain, which was undoubtedly the cause of his death. This wound, the doctors, say, could not have been caused by the supposed fall from the loft, but must have resulted from the blow of some instrument, similar to a hammer. An inquest will be held. Walker was about thirty years old and was at one time a jockey.
