The extracts are as follows: "Khalid or Kaled. A Saracen general, surnamed 'The sword of God.' He commanded the Meccan force, which defeated Momunionen a body. The eleven o'clock hammed at Obed in 625. He afterwards became a follower of the prophet, and was placed by Mohammed's successor, Aba-Bekr, in command of an expedition against Syria. He defeated the Byzantine army in a decisive battle on the Hieromax (Yarmuk), and captured Damascus in 636; died at Emesa, 642 A.D. -Century Cyclopedia of Names.

His name is given by the Encyclopedia. Britannica, as Khalid ben al-Walid. date of his death is usually given as 642. but Le Grande Encyclopedia placed it in 641, and Hughes dictionary Islam in 639.




