The archbishop as soon as The bishop elect shall accept, will leave for England, to return for the consecration in St. George's cathethral on St. Luke's festival, Thursday, October 18th. The new bishop will receive at first a stipend of \$2,500 and a house and have full exercise of the episcopal functions and patronage of the diocese. On the death of the archbishop his income will be \$3,500 probably. The archbishop will receive a retiring allowance equal to \$2,-345. The agreements as to procedure have been signed by the archbishop and on behalf of the synod by dean Smith, Rev. Prof. Worrell, judge Macdonald and Edw. J. B. Pense; and as to financial arrangements by chancellor Walkem and canon Spencer, secretary.
