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
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

this place, Stellenbosch; we came upon it suddenly and were surprised at its size, the nature of the people and their kindness. It is forty miles from Cape Town, is pretty and clean. Mud is unknown here. On each side of the street runs a little stream of water, giving a cooling appearance to the place; it was not a deep ditch, but just a shallow hed. The people, white and black alike, came out and gave us drinks, watermelens, apples, quinces, etc. The minister gave us eigars and matches. On the street I saw a Salvation army officer and two lassies in the familiar dress of the Salvation army. There was more enthusiasm in the little town than we have met with since leaving Ontario. We are nearing disaffected parts, and the people hereabouts are glad to see the British soldiers, as the Boers are getting impertinent. The night before we arrived one of the sentries in the camp was shot by a Boer. After leaving Stellenbosch, five or six miles behind, we l came to this camp. Part of the British veomanry and other British troops are here, and also some native cavalry from India. There are hundreds of mules and horses in camp. Just before reaching here I saw four ostriches; we are always on the watch for new sights, and have come across scorpions, chamelons and other strange creatures; if I can get any of these when returning I will present them to Queen's college.
