Kruger Fled in the Direction of Lorenzo Marques--The City Authorities Went Out to Receive the British Troops.

London, May 31 .- Pretoria has surrendered. Kruger has fled in the direction of Lorenzo Marques. The burgomaster and a committee of citizens went out to meet the British troops.

THE FIRST NEWS SENT TO LONDON.

London, May 31 .- The Daily Mail publishes the following despatch from the earl of Rosslyn, who was a prisoner at Pretoria, and who, as a civilian, appears to have been released.

"Pretoria, May 30, (11.40 a.m.)-Pretoria will be occupied in about two hours without resistance.

"The president has gone to Watervalboven. "The burgomaster, Desousa, is authorized to receive the British. He, with an influential committee of citizens, including chief-justice Gregorowski, have been appointed to preserve life and property during the interregnum.

"Everything is quiet but crowds are waiting expectantly in the church square for the arrival of the British.
