to amend the agriculture and arts act. The premier brought in a bill respecting county jails. It provides that where the prisoners in a jail do not exceed three per day for two years an agreement may be of jailor occurs, and the number of prisonceeded seven per day, the county council sheriff may agree with the council for remuneration to act as ex-officio jailor.

The baby farm bill was introduced. In addition to making the baby farm regulation compulacry, it provides that all fants placed out for adoption be placed under a kind of supervision by the provincial superintendent of neglected child though no special assistance is given by

To guard against infanticide, a special provision is made by which children may be placed out for adoption on the application to and approval of the provincial de-


