

## Croup Is The Terror of Thousands

Of Young Mothers, Because Its Approach Is So Insidious, and Its Outbreaks So Agonizing and Frequently Fatal.

Croup usually commences with a cough, more or less fever, alternate hot and cold spells, flushed face, watery red eyes and restlessness at night. Not a moment should be lost, whether the case be common cold or not; it may develop into true croup.
