

PLAGUE IN INDIA AGAIN.

LONDON, Jan. 24 - There is reason fear that India is perilously threatened I an enemy more dangerous than the frontier tribesmen. The plague has re-appeared this time in a form of which gravity cannot be mistaken. A correspondent, writing barely a month since from Bombay, states his belief that the present trial will be far more severe than that of last year. At the date of his letter the town of Bombay was the "one bright spot in the melancholy picture. Contrasted with its comparative immunity was the terrible state of the rest of the presidency. The official figures, he said, showed that during the present outbreak there had been no fewer than 34,000 cases with some 27,000 deaths, and there had been instances of "whole villages being found suffering from plague which were reported by the local native officials as being bealthy."
