PEKIN, Jan. 26.—Another loan conference with the Tsung Li Yamen has taken place, the latter receiving the Russian representative in the morning, and the British minister in the afternoon. It is believed the British minister, Sir Claude M. Macdonald, insists upon the opening the port of Ta Lien Wan, and that Great Britain will from that demand. Whether Great Britian or Russia secures the loan depends upon which exerts the greatest pressure. If Great Britain undertakes to protect China against Russia's displeasure it is believed the lon will be concluded on the terms proposed by Sir Claude M. M. Macdonald. Germany's lease of Kiao Chou has finally been fixed at ninety nine years. The Chinese emperor is greatly displeased.
