Hardy, premier of the banner province of the primary colony of the greatest empire on earth. Although not a Kingstoniau, Mr. Hardy's interests are, nevertheless, so closely allied to the limestone city that he might almost be claimed a son adoption. He has had as his leader for years a son of Kingston, and he has been a-sociated with many brilliant men who have gone forth from this city. Leaving aside the fact of his being the premier, so favorably is he known here through his past political career and connections already referred to that there would have guaranteed him as warm a welcome from even so great a number as assembled in the opera house last night.
