QUEBEC'S MAYOR AND COUNCIL NOT TO BE BOUGHT.

A Railway Contractor Loses Some Mocey and Gains Some Experience—Refuse to Assist the Great Northern Railway. QUEBEC, Feb. 14.—This morning's 2 Chronicle states: A certain railway con-

tractor who deceived himself into supposing that Quebec had a mayor and city council who would sell themselves for filthy lucre, has lost some money in consequence of his erroneous belief and gained some experienced.

The railway man felt so certain that it was hard cash that was wanted to get through the council a by-law for authorizing an exchange of bonds with the Great Northern railway that he deposited \$12,-000 with a banker then doing business here, but now in Montreal. The money was for the purpose of influencing the action of the council. The game did not work, however, and then came demands or the return of money.
