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

POPE CELEBRATES MASS.

Tuousands Of People Witness The Magnificent Scene In St. Peter's Church.

ROME, Feb. 14. - The pope celebrated mass in St. Peter's this morning. The basilica was crowded. There were present 15,000 residents of Rome and pilgrims from every province in Italy, including a large number of Catholic clubs which brought their banners and insignia. The ceremony was the celebration of the eixtieth anniversary of the first mass of his boliness. The pope was attired in red and wore a gold chain around his neck. He was borne the whole length of the church in the sedia kestatoria on the shoulders of six footmen, amid the ringing notes of silver trumpets. The effect upon the vast assembly was intense. After the mass his boliness was again carried through the church, wearing his tiara. He kept his hand raised in continual blessing as he passed through the throng. The pope's voice was strong and his appearance created much enthusiasm.
